## **The Main Internet Explorer Screen**


If you are using **Internet Explorer** version **8.0** or **9.0** you should be presented with a window similar to the one depicted below.  
To ascertain which version of **IE** you are using, click the **HELP** menu at the top of your Internet Explorer window and click **About Internet Explorer**.

You may notice that some of the website pages that appear on your browser are not quite the same as the ones I have depicted in my illustrations.  
This is simply due to changes of design or enhancements to a site and will not affect the purpose of this tutorial and should be of no concern.

**Address Bar** - This is where you would type an **address** (URL)

Click here to refresh your search then press **<ENTER>**

**Taskbar**

**System tray**



Once you are connected, an icon similar to  or  should appear somewhere on the right end of the taskbar in the system tray.

### The Web-site address (URL) breakdown

An Internet or **Web-site address** (known as a **URL**, or Uniform Resource Locator) typically comprises four sections.

For example, the address <http://www.yale.edu/> provides the following information:

**http:** This Web server uses Hypertext Transfer Protocol (HTTP).

**www:** This site is on the World Wide Web.

**yale:** The Web server is at Yale University.

**edu:** This is an educational institution.

**Tip:** You do not have to worry about the '**http://**' part of the address. Simply type in [www.yale.edu](http://www.yale.edu/) and the rest will be completed automatically after you press <Enter>.

### Home Page

When you use Internet Explorer for the first time, certain software defaults are set, which you can change to your own preference.

To change your **Home Page** to your preference:

- Click the **Tools** menu and select **Internet Options...**
- Now click the **General** tab.
- In the '**Home Page**' section, type e.g. [www.google.co.uk](http://www.google.co.uk/) or your chosen search engine address into the address box.
- Now click **Apply** and **OK**.

Your site will be accessed automatically every time you open Internet Explorer (**IE**).

If you wanted to try a different search engine to see what additional information you can gain on a particular subject, type some of the following popular search engines into the address bar and press <ENTER>:

Once the home page of the search engine appears you can search for your chosen topic by typing into the search box or select a **hyperlink** (link) from those on the page, should it be related to the subject that you seek.
